Missions Era

Paul Roman Empire Paul <u>expands</u> the church into

next two decades.

REVIEW FROM LAST WEEK:

- Saul is traveling to Damascus to find and persecute Christians, when Jesus appears to him from heaven and Saul is converted to Christianity.
- Jesus changes his name to Paul.
- Jesus expressly tells Paul to become a missionary to the Gentiles.
- This marks a transition in the nature of the church, because up to this time, the message has been given exclusively to Jews.

Interesting Fact:

All of Paul's missionary journey's started in Antioch.

4 Major Subjects in the Missions Era:

- 1. First Missionary Journey: Galatia for two years
- 2. Second Missionary Journey: Greece for three years
- 3. Third Missionary Journey: Asia for four years
 - Even though Paul is warned that he will be imprisoned upon his return to Jerusalem, he returns anyway and is immediately arrested.
- 4. Trials and Imprisonment: Roman prison for two years
 - After being in a Roman prison for two years, it is said Pau was beheaded.

The Epistles

IMPORTANT FACTS:

- Epistles = letters written to churches and individuals to encourage them and instruct them
- 13 written by Paul and 9 by different authors

4 Main Study Topics for the Epistles:

- 1. The Nature of the Epistles: Doctrine, then duty
 - The typical pattern of the Epistles is to write a section of doctrinal truth and follow up with the practical implications of that trust. (Doctrine, then duty. Principle, then practice.)

2. Pauline Epistles to Churches: Letters to local churches

To Churches

- Romans: doctrinal, with the most complete doctrine of salvation by grace through faith in all of the Bible
- 1 & 2 Corinthians: practical, deals with specific problems in the Corinthian church
- Galatians: written to some of Paul's first converts, refuting legalism

- Ephesians: deals with believer's position in Christ and its practical implications
- Philippians: a warm letter of joy to despite trials
- Colossians: the *preeminence* of Christ is its major theme
- 1 & 2 Thessalonians: very personal letters dealing with specific issues in the Thessalonian church, including *prophecy* and *practical* living

3. Pauline Epistles to <u>Individuals</u>: Letters to individuals and pastors To Individuals

- 1 & 2 Timothy: two letters to a young pastor in Ephesus. The first *counsels* him on local church issues and the second *encourages* him to remain strong in the faith in the midst of trials.
- **Titus:** written to a pastor of the church on the island of Crete, it deals with local church issues, including *qualifications* of church leaders
- **Philemon:** written to a slave owner urging lenient treatment of a runaway *slave* who has become a Christian and is returning to his Christian master

4. General Epistles: Letters to the Christian Public

Written by various authors, they are letters to the Christian public at large with the exception of 2 John and 3 John.

- Hebrews: doctrinal, draws on Old Testament truth to teach New Testament truth to a Jewish audience
- James: deals with the proper way Christian faith should be carried out in everyday life
- 1 & 2 Peter: written to believers scattered throughout Asia and Galatia, deals with the proper response to *suffering* and opposition
- 1, 2, 3 John: letters from the apostle John dealing with the *love* of God and how it is carried out in the lives of Christians
- Jude: a brief book warning against ungodly living
- **Revelation:** prophetical, deals with the nature and chronology of the *end times*.
